ORDINANCE NO. 2020 - 20

AN ORDINANCE PERTAINING TO THE LOCAL CURE PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the City of Troy, Madison County, Illinois (“City”) is an Illinois municipality, eligible for reimbursement of funds through the Local Coronavirus Urgent Remediation Emergency Support Program (Local CURE Program), 20 ILCS 605/605-1045; and

WHEREAS, the Local CURE Program is funded from financial assistance the State of Illinois received through the U.S. Department of the Treasury’s Coronavirus Relief Fund (CFDA No. 21.019) authorized under section 601(a) of the Social Security Act, as added by section 5001 of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act, P.L. 116-136 (“CARES Act”); and

WHEREAS, as a Local Government recipient of financial support through the Local CURE Program, the City is required to utilize the financial support received from the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (the “Department”) for the specific purposes and in compliance with the terms and certifications of the Local CURE Program; and

WHEREAS, the corporate authorities of the City have determined that it is advisable, necessary and in the best interest of the City to enter into the attached Local CURE Program Financial Support Conditions and Certification in order to participate in and receive the funding pursuant to the Local CURE Program.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TROY, MADISON COUNTY, ILLINOIS, AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE 1

The foregoing recitals shall be and are hereby incorporated as findings of fact as if said recitals were fully set forth herein.

ARTICLE 2

The Financial Support Conditions and Certification in substantially the form of the exhibit attached hereto is hereby incorporated herein by reference, authorized and approved.

ARTICLE 3

The Mayor is hereby authorized to execute and deliver and the City Clerk is hereby authorized to attest to said execution of said certification in substantially the form of the exhibit appended hereto as so authorized and approved for and on behalf of the City.

ARTICLE 4

SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this Ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstances is ruled unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Ordinance that can be given effect without the invalid application or provision, and each invalid provision or invalid application of this Ordinance is severable.

ARTICLE 5

REPEAL OF CONFLICTING PROVISIONS. All ordinances and resolutions, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of the conflict, expressly repealed on the effective date of this Ordinance.

ARTICLE 6

EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect on the 8th day of September, 2020.

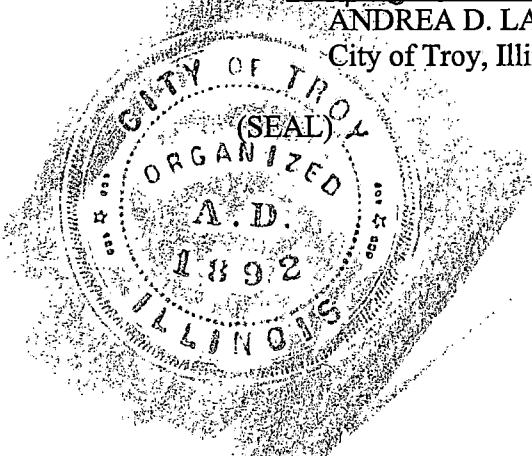

RE: COVID-19 Update: Wednesday, September 2, 2020

PLEASE READ THIS ENTIRE DOCUMENT

Today, the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) announced **2,128 new confirmed cases of coronavirus disease (COVID-19) in Illinois with 32,751 test specimens reported in the last 24 hours. Laboratories have reported a total of 4,119,873 tests administered in Illinois to date. IDPH has reported a total of 238,643 cases, including 8,091 deaths, including 27 deaths in the last 24 hours, in Illinois. Preliminary seven-day statewide positivity for cases as a percent of total tests from August 26 through September 1 is 4.5%. Cases by county can be found on the state's coronavirus website at coronavirus.illinois.gov.**

On September 1, President Donald Trump's Presidential Memorandum regarding a payroll tax deferral (available via this link) went into effect through December 31, 2020. The Internal Revenue Service's (IRS) Notice 2020-65 (available via this link), issued on August 28, 2020, provides guidance to employers. Municipalities are able to participate in this voluntary program, if they choose to do so. Additional information about the IRS's notice and the deferral is available in a memo, requested by the Illinois Municipal League (IML), from accounting firm Kerber, Eck and Braeckel.

Today, new mitigation efforts go into effect for Region 4 (Metro East) only. Those mitigation efforts are available via this link. Region 4 is a seven-county region including only Bond, Clinton, Madison, Monroe, Randolph, St. Clair and Washington counties. Governor JB Pritzker signed Executive Order 2020-54 (available via this link) implementing the new mitigations for Region 4.

Governor Pritzker ordered that restaurants, bars, gaming venues and casinos must close by 11:00 p.m. and are not permitted to re-open until 6:00 a.m. the following day. This restriction currently only applies to Region 4 and Region 7.

Region 7's enhanced mitigations that went into effect on August 26 are still in effect for Kankakee and Will counties only. Those mitigations were detailed in our August 24 COVID-19 update (available via this link) sent directly to Region 7 municipal officials. Region 7 is a two-county region including only Kankakee and Will counties.

All other regions remain in Phase 4 (Revitalization) of the "Restore Illinois" plan. All Phase 4 guidelines are available on the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity's (DCEO) COVID-19 website via this link. As an additional resource, DCEO has developed Frequently Asked Questions (available via

IDPH has released [guidance \(available via this link\)](#) for preventing the spread of COVID-19 at election polling places. This guidance is helpful if municipal facilities are utilized as polling places for the November 3, 2020, General Election.

In June, the Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) issued orders approving two COVID-19 Utility Relief Agreements with large and small Illinois private utilities. More information about that is available in the [ICC's press release via this link](#). The agreements ended the moratorium on private utility disconnections and suspensions of late payment fees. Many of those private utilities though have voluntarily continued the suspension of disconnections for residential customers. [More information about those voluntary disconnections is available via this link](#).

The ICC moratorium was only mandated for private utility providers, not municipal or public utility providers. It is entirely within the discretion of the local unit of government to determine what steps should be taken with their utility accounts. We encourage public utilities to follow pre-existing policies and normal procedures.

As a reminder, the Illinois Liquor Control Commission has issued [guidance \(available via this link\)](#) confirming that local liquor control commissioners may temporarily suspend a liquor license for a period of seven days if the operation of the business "will immediately threaten the welfare of the community." Please review this guidance as it may relate to activities of licensed establishments operating under Phase 4 guidelines or enhanced mitigations.

If a restaurant or bar is not properly following the spirit and/or intent of these regulations, local officials may refer complaints to the Illinois State Police to handle disbursement of crowds or patrons and IDPH or the local public health department to provide further enforcement mechanisms. Municipal officials should consult with their legal counsel or retained attorney prior to taking any formal or informal action.

DCEO is currently in the process of sending certification agreements to municipalities to establish the requirements and the funding level for each eligible municipality under the Local CURE program, which is the local funding from the federal CARES Act. These agreements should be approved by the corporate authorities and returned to DCEO as soon as possible and prior to October 1. IML's legal staff has drafted a model ordinance ([PDF version available via this link](#)) allowing the municipality to agree to the certification agreement. The Local CURE program is only available for municipalities in the 97 counties that did not receive direct funding from the federal government in the CARES Act. Municipalities within Cook, DuPage, Kane, Lake and Will counties should contact their county government for additional information regarding how each county intends to share their federal CARES Act allocation with municipalities. IML has asked each of the five counties to develop a process to share funding with their municipalities. [An example of those letters is available via this link](#).

On August 3, Governor JB Pritzker announced the creation of an "It Only Works If You Wear It" public awareness campaign to promote the use of face coverings. [The Governor's press release and materials for the campaign are available via this link](#).

On an unrelated, but important, note, Governor Pritzker is hosting a 2020 Census Briefing call tomorrow, Thursday, September 3, at 3:00 p.m. CT. The call will provide an update on the state's

Those metrics include COVID-19 admissions to the region's hospitals, the region's COVID-19 test positivity rate and the available surge capacity at the region's hospitals. **IDPH is now providing metrics for each individual county (available via this link).**
